



Message from the Founder

Our Patron Keshav Desiraju, passed on very suddenly on Teachers Day, Sept 5th, the day he would visit us each year. He was the go-to person, to discuss new ideas and for advice when looking for solutions. We greatly miss his presence in our

midst. Our deep respects and a homage to him. His memory will be alive in our hearts.

In April 2021, the global experience of a pandemic was one year old, we had already lived through a year, "like never before". There were great expectations of the lock down opening up and all of us getting back to our original way of working. But that was not to be, the pandemic continued for one more year and only by March 2022, did organisations like ours, serving a highly vulnerable population, dare to experiment with the hybrid model – a mix of online and face to face work.

So, online it was for most of the year. The first year had been amazing and we were able to reach our students and their families quite effectively, however by year two, the entire multi-disciplinary team of therapists and special educators were really flying high in their knowledge and skills with technology. The 'tech team' became stronger, they researched and explored extensively. We were using Zoom, Google Meet, WhatsApp and You tube to take classes, oversee therapy sessions and even do assessments for new entrants.

There was training of our B.Ed., students and Headmasters and Teachers from our rural schools which had innovative trainings with breakout rooms and many interactive sessions. The cherry on the cake were the virtual events, many webinars and celebrations like Children's Day, Christmas & Diwali parties and World Cerebral Palsy Day. These brought together students and families, it was a joy to meet them online.

Some physical contact was also there, families in need would visit Vidya Sagar from time to time, for grocery support and nutrition supplements that are provided for malnourished children. Students were also provided the assistive devices they needed. The orthotics person visited each home to take measurements and do the fittings. Special furniture if needed was also sent home and modification of some homes was done.

The pandemic did not stop us from taking on innovative and important partnerships:

- 1. We were involved in designing and curating a demonstration center of assistive technology named the Museum of Possibilities, a Government of Tamil Nadu initiative.
- 2. We were invited to support the District Early Intervention Center in Stanley Hospital, Chennai and do training for the staff on neo-natal physiotherapy.
- 3. We were invited to train parents and staff of NIEPMD (National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities) in AAC (Augmentative and Alternative Communication).
- 4. We built a tactile path in the district hospital in Tiruvallur, as this is part of our community-based rehabilitation operational area.
- 5. With other disability groups we advocated for a pathway on the beach for wheelchairs.
- 6. We advocated for Sign Language Interpreters in judicial centers.
- 7. The Rehabilitation Council of India approved our B.Ed., course for next 5 years.
- 8. 21 students completed the School Leaving Exam.
- 9. We had face to face interns from Management Schools and some internship were online.
- 10. Vidya Sagar even has its own You tube channel, with many lessons and therapy classes.
- 11. Arts Practice for Inclusion a brilliant training by Snehdhara Bangaluru was attended by three of our staff members.

Listing some of these achievements, in a difficult hybrid year, makes me feel proud of the Vidya Sagar team. They are certainly flying higher and stronger.

Wishing the students, their families, volunteers, staff and esteemed, supporters, much Joy and Fulfillment in the coming year.

Vidya Sagar, in partnership with NIEPMD conducted a 45 days virtual training for their staff and a training for parents on "Using AAC on a day-to-day basis".

Two of our staff conducted a session on "Handling children at home during the pandemic" to around 150 NIEPMD parents.

We got the RCI approval for our B.Ed., course on Multiple Disabilities for the next five years and University approval for three years.

Our Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) staff conducted training for the Government school teachers to sensitize them on inclusive education and for community workers & few staff on self-care, equality & equity and patriarchy in partnership with Schools of Equality.

Vidya Sagar and Bhumi conducted a virtual workshop for 500+ special educators, district, and state coordinators to sensitize them on "Right To Education" (RTE).

APPI first grant got over by November 2021 and the second grant got approved for the next 3 years for both FBR & CBR, amounting to about 4.24 crores.

Vidya Sagar in partnership with CBR Global netwrok launched Include-an online training programme based on CBR guidelines developed by WHO. This is for CBR professionals and community workers across the globe. 26 students have registered and 5 CBR experts have given their consent to be their learning companions.

The DLU did access audit for School of Social Work, Kumuraguru College of Liberal Arts & Science and also was part of the sensitization workshop for Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) and Airport staff on how to handle persons with disabilities in the airport.

We conducted various fun events online for students from 4 different mainstream schools to increase awareness about AAC.

Two of our staff conducted a session on "Importance of Neonatal Physiotherapy in Early Intervention" for 40 pediatricians at the Institute of Child health and Hospital (ICH), Egmore

The FBR team is already working with the ICH and the Public Health Center West Mambalam. We got invited to work with Stanley hospital for screening high risk babies and program planning. Our staff have started visiting them since mid-february.

We had IAS officers from Deputy Commissioner Works & Deputy Commissioner Education of Chennai Corporation visiting Vidya Sagar to understand the accessibility features of the building.


Two of our senior staff attended a month-long course in the topic of "A Foundation in Social Role Valorization".

Yet another year of innovation in crisis...

Vidya Sagar has once again lived up to Basavas' saying "Things standing shall fall, but the moving ever shall stay".

April 2021- During the annual case conference at the end of the first pandemic year, the staff met and enthusiastically planned department wise for the forthcoming academic year. We had all believed that we will be getting back to face to face working, but it was unfortunate that the pandemic struck again.

We had to re-look at the entire planning with respect to online mode of working. Given the previous year's experience, it was much easier to get back to online sessions. We came up with an updated Standard Operating Plan for the next year. We continued to have all the committees-Doctors panel, Psychologist, and Psychiatrist support, Technical, Advocacy and Safety committees supporting students and their families based on their needs.

Vidya Sagar's foremost priority was to ensure all its staff, students, parents, siblings, and anyone above 18 years got vaccinated at the earliest. Few of our parents and community workers had expressed their apprehension in taking the vaccine due to various rumors circulating in social media. We shared authentic information through experienced doctors and arranged online counseling for our stakeholders who had concerns about taking vaccine. Disability Rights Alliance (DRA) supported in arranging door step vaccination for many stakeholders with high support needs. We also organized stay options and support staff for some of our current & alumni students in case of their caregivers being afflicted with COVID-19.



Though we were disappointed that we could not get back to face to face mode, we realigned our minds to bounce back to online mode of work. During the first year of of pandemic, it was challenging and took time to set a structure and online routines for the students. This year, we had more experience and we could set the days and time for online sessions in a more structured manner. We ensured reasonable accommodation for working parents and offered flexible timings.

We saw a need to build capacities and to enhance our technical skills for creating better online resources. So, 25 of our staff & 2 high school students underwent an online technical training conducted by AIMS Media for topics such as professional photography (camera shots & angles), video editing, scripting, character designing, digital sketching,

2D animation & effects.



Once these 25 staff members got advanced level training externally, we decided to knowledge share and train the rest of the staff in smaller groups internally. All our staff members are now very confident in conducting their online classes, creating & sharing resources, making posters, editing videos etc. During the recent holidays, we received many customized greeting cards made by our staff.

We continued to host Physical and Emotional Well-being workshops for our staff, parents, and students. The Understanding Disabilities series also continued on a bi-monthly basis. Our school virtual events such as Independence Day, Teachers Day, World CP Day, World Mental Health day, AAC & Inclusion week, Children's Day, International Day of Persons with Disability and Christmas party got even better this year with creative themes and ideas for celebration. Apart from this, our students also got to enjoy online events conducted by other organizations which they used to attend in person earlier such as Anjali program in Bhuvneshwar.

Vidya Sagar realized that parents were multi-tasking at home with personal and

official work and also supporting their ward's online session. To give them a much-deserved break and a chance to catch up with other parents, virtual fun activities/games were conducted in small groups. We received great feedback and parents asked us to continue these activities as it was very relaxing and a stress buster for many of them.

We continued to give learning materials, aids & adaptations along with health & nutrition supplements to build immunity for students who come from low socio-economic background.

Virtual training was continued by many departments especially AAC, CBR & Vision. Vidya Sagar gave technical support to other NGOs for few events.

Our staff participated in many webinars, workshops and did virtual consultations conducted on different topics.

December 2021 - All VS staff met in person to come up with a plan for the final term of year 2021-22. The plan was made according to the feedback and consent by the parents and students above 18 years. The responses from google form helped us to understand the number of students willing to come to school. This helped us plan and schedule sessions in person, their transport needs, other reasonable accommodations, prioritizing therapy needs for students and continue the academic sessions online. We ensured that all

necessary steps were taken to adhere to the safety protocols.

Hybrid Model:

- Every student got an opportunity to come to school at least once a week.
- The students could avail once a week individual therapy service.
- The number of sessions depended on the number of students who needed offline sessions.
- The online sessions for special education, chat, art, and craft continued online.
- σ For those who did not wish to avail offline therapy services, online services continued.

For students above 18 years

- The adults in the production centre attended work twice a week from 10 am to 4 pm.
- The adults from the vocational training availed services once a week from 10 am to 1 pm.
- The adults from the vocational training 2 (ALP), continued to avail the online model.

- The Vidya Sagar team made home visits to offer necessary services once a term.
- The high school academic students (those who are doing NIOS, 10th &12th standard) attended in-person classes twice a week from 10 am to 1 pm.

Hybrid model celebrations:

Though we reopened school physically, we continued to celebrate events in online mode so that everyone could participate in the celebrations.

Our Annual Day was planned to be 3-day event, including 2 days of virtual VAccesS. On this special occasion, we had our second series of Endowment lecture by Jo Chopra (Latika Roy Foundation), followed by a fun filled children's carnival. Children came in a staggered manner, following all safety protocols and enjoyed the games and rides organised with a lot of love by the staff.

VAccesS 2022 had approximately 300 participants attending the event both the days. Organizing a virtual event of this magnitude was a big challenge. With excellent technical team and dedicated staff, we were able to plan and execute this one of kind event.

There were 32 eminent panelists across the 8 domains joining from Asia, Europe, and America and they were experts in the field and have a deep understanding of the domains. We had interesting and thought-provoking discussions between them.

Museum of Possibilities (MOP)

The Museum of Possibilities was slated to be inaugurated on December 3rd, 2021 but due to various reasons, it got postponed many times. Meanwhile, the museum staff underwent extensive training to gear up for the impending inauguration and gtting ready to handle visitors. https://tnmop.in

Financial impact

We needed to relook at the financial aspects for all projects. From our actual budget, we only got around 60-70% of funds from CSR companies. But the deficits became much less comparatively because of online mode of functioning and we had to raise funds only for salaries of staff who were not covered under projects and for some maintenance work.

Statutory compliances:

The National Trust, Sanitation, Fire NOC, Lift license, Building license, Transport (vehicle fitness & license), Land lease, Society registration and Structural soundness, Sanitation and School recognition have all been renewed and are currently up to date.

FCRA renewal has been applied on November 25^{th} , 2021 for five years. It has been verified and is in process. 80G, 12AA applied on November 2021 – we have got the provisional renewal (10AC).

Other projects:

The Regional Action on Inclusive Education (RAISE) was an ambitious and inspiring project to work on quality inclusive education for children in SSA Schools in the North East. It spanned over 5 States in selected districts, with 15 NGO Partners and 80 SSA Schools. The project design included five result areas and completed the five-year period. The evaluation of Northeast project was done over a span of eight months. The evaluation team was lead by our founder Poonam Natarajan and experts from different organisations across India were part of the evaluation.

During the unprecedented times, Vidya Sagar team showcased their unity by getting together to find new alternatives to continue services and stay connected with the stakeholders.

With lots of positive vibes, we look forward to offline functioning in the next academic year.


Donor Relations & Fund Management

Family Based Rehabilitation comprises of Advisory & Referral (the first entry point to Vidya Sagar), Home Management (flexible time table for students along with hands on parent training) and Early Intervention (a parent training model focussing on holistic development of the children less than 6 years through play way method).


• With the COVID-19 pandemic continuing for the second consecutive academic year, we continued with our sessions, consultations, workshops, events, classes, assessments and programme planning online. Various social media such as WhatsApp, Google Meet and Zoom helped us to connect with our stakeholders regularly.

- Due to the lockdown situation, some of the families shifted to their native place and few got transferred to other states. Our online classes continued throughout the year and we had children from districts like Krishnagiri, Madurai and a child from Vijayawada and Kolkata. One child who had relocated to the UK, continued to attend the online sessions.
- Dietician follow ups: Online diet consultations were done for new students as well as follow ups from previous year. We observed good improvement among children in terms of their weight as well as their diet intake. Through the year, 34 children got dietician consultation.
- Children participated in virtual events like the Children's day, World Cerebral Palsy day and Christmas party. Their participation in fancy dress, music and dance were very well appreciated.
- Parent awareness programmes and trainings were conducted through social media such as Zoom and Google meet. Every month, one parent meeting and awareness programme were conducted. These programmes were telecast live through YouTube, which was easily accessible to many parents. All the workshops were conducted in dual languages. Tamil translation and sign language interpreters were available in all the meetings. There were 4 workshops conducted with the HRD, including Physical wellness by Yoga master Vijay, Emotional wellness by Anu Naidu, Understanding disabilities series including Parkinsons, Acid attack, Mental illness and Multiple sclerosis.

Other services

- Nutrition supplements were given regularly to children from low socio economic background every month in all centres.
- We sent hand function materials and teaching learning materials to all the children's houses, which was useful while taking online classes for parents as well as teachers.

Ensuring appropriate aids to children

We worked with the Orthotist and he supported us by visiting children's homes to take measurements and do the trial. Once the aid was fitting well and approved, it was handed over to the child. We made nearly 42 orthotic aids for Chennai based children and 10 for rural EI centre based children. From the classrooms, furnitures such as 90° sitting chairs, cut out tables, potty chairs, wheelchairs and adapted baby size toilet seats were delivered to 12 children's homes for use. Our teachers and therapists were in constant calls with families supporting them all the time.

Community Outreach-Assessments, Screening and Training in other organisations

We started direct assessment of children in Public Health Centre (PHC), West Mambalam and Institute of Child Health & Hospital (ICH) from January 2021 onwards. In the previous year, due to COVID-19 second wave, we had stopped direct screening since the month of May, and resumed again from August 2021. Two

staff members go to PHC for a half day morning session on Tuesdays and Fridays. For ICH, one staff goes on Monday and another on Friday for half a day in the mornings.

• The Social Pediatric Department in Stanley Hospital, Washermanpet, Chennai contacted us to support their District Early Intervention Centre (DEIC), especially children with Cerebral Palsy and other Developmental delays. From Feb 2022 onwards we started supporting DEIC of Stanley hospital by visiting weekly twice for half days.

Internship

For the first time, we had virtual internships by two second year undergraduate students for four months. One intern, Ms.Ananya Srikanth did three "Best from Waste" workshop for parents, wherein she taught how to make handcrafted material from the unused or waste available at home. She also helped us to design some of our pamphlets.


Ms.Mamathy, took online spoken English classes for six of our parents, who had expressed interest in learning. She took three classes every week for 1 hour and totally did sessions for 30 hours.

Parent's feedback

We got good response from our parents for online classes, events, workshops and trainings. We also got few medical referrals. We never thought that social media would help in reaching out to our stakeholders like this. In the survey shared with parents, many also opted for hybrid model of direct classes and online classes in the near future, after the pandemic situation is over. A few parents shifted from Chennai to their native places, or other towns due to the COVID and they want our support in future also.


Rural interventions

Caption: Beneficiary count-Aage and Gender



Niramaya insurance - Enrollment

Vidya Sagar is registered with The National Trust, a statutory body of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, set up under the "National Trust for the Welfare of Persons with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Mental Retardation and Multiple Disabilities" Act.. The renewal of the registration was done in March 2022 for another 5 years. We have undertaken the Niramaya scheme for the welfare of persons with disabilities, which comes under the National Trust Act 1999.

During the year 2021-2022, Vidya Sagar did nearly 110 new enrolment of different school students for Niramaya scheme. Few special schools in and around Chennai approached us to enroll their students in Niramaya insurance enrolment. We support all special schools and PwDs in Chennai to enroll in this scheme. So far 350 beneficiaries have been enrolled and have benefitted.

About the Scheme

- 1. Affordable Health Insurance to PwDs.
- 2. Health insurance cover of up to Rs. 1.0 lakh.
- 3. Facility for OPD treatment including the medicines, pathology, diagnostic tests, etc, Regular Medical checkup for non-ailing disabled, Dental Preventive Dentistry, Surgery to prevent further aggravation of disability, Non-Surgical / Hospitalization, Corrective Surgeries for existing Disability including congenital disability, Ongoing Therapies to reduce impact of disability and disability related complications, Alternative Medicine.

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- 4. Transportation costs.
- 5. No pre-insurance medical tests required.
- 6. The scheme will be available in the entire country.

The CBR programme fulfils Vidya Sagar's mission of reaching out to rural and slum communities where services are inadequate for persons with disabilities (PWD). We aim to create inclusive communities. To set up a sustainable system, we partner with local organizations working in the development and disability sector to deliver services.

The programme

- ☐ Trains grass root workers and community volunteers to be equipped with trans-disciplinary skills to engage with persons with disabilities across the lifespan
- □ Works collaboratively with all stakeholders persons with disabilities, families, local leaders, Government service providers and other NGO's working in the area
- ☐ Facilitates the creation of Self help groups with people with disabilities to empower them to advocate for their rights and needs and doubles up as a support group
- ☐ Creates resource centres in communities

Our Reach

We are currently working in Thiruvallur, Karur, Virudhunagar districts of Tamil Nadu and two urban slums in North Chennai, catering to the needs of over 2500 people with disabilities. Working across the domains of health, education, livelihood, empowerment and social inclusion, we constantly try to bridge the gap between people's needs and action.

Key Highlights

Partnership with Samagra Shiksha - Project Ellarum Ellamum

Our partnership with Samagra Shiksha, the project "Ellarum Ellamum" aims to provide inclusive education in schools, with the following objectives:

- To increase participation of children with disabilities in mainstream schools using strategies of Universal design in teaching and learning
- To enable all stakeholders involved in the education and empowerment of children with disabilities with appropriate awareness, knowledge and skills for meaningful inclusion and outcomes.
- To promote inclusion for children with disabilities presently in the home-based programmes at schools and community

As a part of our MoU with Samagra Shiksha, we have completed the headmaster's training and teacher's training for the first year, and are continuing our work in the field with our inclusion field workers to promote inclusive education.

Headmaster's and Teacher's training-Highlights

A 2 day workshop (2hrs per day) was conducted for the Government school headmasters of Thiruvallur, Karur, Virudhunagar and Chennai focusing on "Attitudinal barriers and change towards Inclusion", as a first step towards inclusion of children with disabilities in the school.

The session focused on the current barriers- infrastructure, cultural and attitude of the society and also highlighted the effects of "labelling" of a child in a classroom. The workshop gave the headmasters a takeaway component -As a headmaster, my role in moving "one step towards inclusion in my school". A similar workshop titled, "Attitudinal barriers and strategies to promote inclusion", was also conducted for teachers as a first step and a takeaway to include children with disabilities in the classroom. This also focussed on collaborative teaching strategies.

Project I@LEP- Understanding and Enabling Inclusion for Children with High Support Needs

Another project was offered from State Samagara Shiksha to bring children with high support needs from home to school. The focus is to train the Government school special educators and physiotherapists on education, leisure and therapy in order to promote inclusion. This is a pilot project and has been planned to be taken in all districts of Tamil Nadu covering 2000 special educators and therapists across the state. This project kick-started with an online training in March 2022, and will be followed by district wise face to face training by staff of Vidya Sagar and by partnering with other NGO's such as Amar Seva Sangam who have accepted to take training in few districts of Tamil Nadu.

Community workers- Communication devices

Newly appointed community workers were supported with cell phones for efficient communication and coordination with the CBR team and also for MIS updating. Communication devices were also used in accessing contents for education and therapy through videos sent by the CBR team which helped them in continuing their rehabilitation services to the beneficiaries in the community.

Tactile Path- Tiruvallur

As a part of the APPI project, a tactile path was constructed in Kollimedu Government hospital, Tiruvallur to make the space accessible for persons with visual impairment.

Self-help groups

The pandemic situation became a serious threat to livelihood. When it came to the family having a person with disability, the situation became even tougher as they were unable to cope up with the medical, educational and family needs. With the help of our partner organizations, funders and community workers, 16 new self-help groups were formed and loans were given from the banks and from the older self-help groups to provide livelihood opportunities for these families.

Over 40 persons with disabilities benefited through the loans during the pandemic. Self-help groups helped in providing livelihood opportunities such as cattle rearing, livestock management, petty shop maintenance and tailoring. One of the primary highlights of self-help groups was distributing nutrition mix to the beneficiaries, which was part of the covid relief material pack and was produced by one of the self-help groups.

For better and efficient functioning of the SHG, five leadership training sessions were conducted by the local partner organizations and over 70 self-help group leders attended the training.

Caregiver's training

6 community workers of CBR from Chennai and Tiruvallur district have attended the 4 months certification on caregiver training program in Vidya Sagar in partnership with NIEPMD, which helped them to improve their skills and also have a formally certified position in the community for working with persons with disabilities. Many of them have also found employment

Arts Practices for Inclusion

2 staff members of CBR graduated after completing their Iyear course on Arts Practices for Inclusion from Snehadhara Foundations, Bangalore. I staff from CBR started conducting Art practices sessions for Vidya Sagar students weekly once on different art forms including visual arts, music, drama, rhythm and play. API session was also conducted for B.Ed. students to give an introduction to art forms and on how to use these to teach in a multi ability classroom

Caregiver's Workshop

A 2 day workshop was conducted for caregivers in Vidya Sagar by a member of the CBR team. The training focussed on qualities of a caregiver, teamwork and participation, practical problems a caregiver will face at work, group dynamics, assertiveness, privacy, non-judgmental approach, honesty, conflict resolution, decision making and roles and responsibilities of a caregiver through various art forms, discussions and role

Education is the process of facilitating learning and acquisition of knowledge, skills, values, beliefs, and habits. Every child has the right to education.


The Day Center, the Center for special education at Vidya Sagar focuses on giving quality education to students with multiple disabilities. The school is a hub of activities for students between the ages of 6 years to 20 years. Our top priority is to uphold child rights, create equal opportunities for community inclusion, and extend world-class education and rehabilitation services. The total number of students in the school is 110 for the academic year 2021-2022.

The students get academic input (Tamil Nadu State Government curriculum and NIOS), Physiotherapy, Occupational therapy, Speech and language therapy, Computer skills, Art, and Sports. Every student has a unique learning style and pace and the program for each student is chalked out keeping this in mind. An expert multi-disciplinary team guides the teachers in their transdisciplinary approach.

The students in the junior school follow a graded curriculum while the middle and high schools have both academics and functional literacy. Curriculum and activities are carefully created to give enough opportunities for the students to gain life skills. A unique integrated **Transition curriculum** is the main pillar on which the entire curricular plan is done. The transition curriculum covers skills needed for adulthood and is followed by all students right from junior school.

The major focus is on independent living skills for which aids and adaptations including home adaptations play a major role. These are identified, procured and parents trained wherever required.

The second wave of the Covid pandemic threw up new challenges and we had to continue the online learning and ensure that the learning process continues. We started the academic year with staff training in multimedia to equip us with skills to create an accessible platform that stimulates and enhances the self-learning of students who are stuck at home for the second consecutive year.

We also distributed sensory materials to keep the students calm and focused and materials for improving the hand function. Adapted leisure materials, posture maintenance wheelchairs, and adaptations for daily activities were also sent home. Nutrition supplements were distributed too.

Understanding the pressure on parents in the e-learning process, we conducted a fun day (once a month) for parents virtually. This was well appreciated and was a great success.

During the pandemic, we had 21 students clearing their school-leaving exams through the National Open School. 11 students cleared 10th std (Tamil medium) and 6 (English medium) while 4 cleared the 12th standard (English medium).

Two students got an opportunity for internship/training in a leading Bakery-Winners while another student got admission in Diploma in AC Mechanic course in Thakkar Bapa (3 months course). Those were celebrating moments for all of us.

Along with academic plans, our students eagerly participated in the World Cerebral Palsy Day by sending in videos and photos of them using various aids and adaptations at home. Our students participated in a quiz, "Quizabled" conducted by SPASTN and also registered for the Science Film Festival by Goethe Institute /Max Mueller Bhavan.


We had a virtual Children's Day Celebration and had an interactive storytelling session by Mrs. Sowmya Srinivasan. World Disability Day and Christmas Day celebrations were full of fun and pomp with high school students and vocational trainees taking a lead in the former event while the teachers and staff came up with a lively show to entertain students at the virtual Christmas day party.

As the grip of the pandemic was loosening, we started planning for the reopening of the school for students in February 2022. After consultation with parents, a hybrid model of both offline and online sessions was planned. We had High school students coming in batches so we could maintain covid protocol and other students received need-based services like physio and communication in offline sessions while continuing with the online academic sessions.

A virtual two-day event showcasing access solutions -VAccesS was conducted in March which turned out to be a huge success with appreciation pouring in from across the country.

The academic year ended with staff workshops, team-building activities, and a plan for the next year.



- This year we, as a team completed the curriculum for vocational courses crafted considering the element of cross disabilities for accreditation to NCVT
- Four of our students have taken up higher studies and have enrolled for a course on retail marketing with Swabodhini
- Self-motivation and interpersonal skills developed among our students during the pandemic period.
- Support system: The staff was in constant touch with all the parents and offered support emotionally, and during critical situations financial support was also given. We encouraged parent to parent support, and it became stronger during these challenging times. The parents supported each other both emotionally and financially whenever there was a need. Vidya Sagar also supported one surgery for an adult stake- holder.
 - Most of the adults got friends in their community and neighbourhood areas.

• The adults participated in all Vidya Sagar events and celebrations. We also celebrated World Friendship Day.

Department of Speech, Language & Communication

The academic year of 2021-22 was a mixed year of both online and offline sessions. During the first half of the academic year communication sessions were held online and the second was a hybrid model of both online and offline.

We conducted almost 3 weeks of virtual Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) training for Speech-language pathologists from NIEPMD in August which was well attended and achieved its objectives of creating AAC-trained speech therapists.

In the month of October 2021, AAC awareness month was celebrated online by involving 3 inclusive schools to make them understand the importance of AAC and how it would help them to interact efficiently with their special needs peers. The fun-filled activities were well received and reiterated the importance of AAC.

The month of October 2021, saw another moment of pride for the department. The department took part in EMPOWER 2021 organized by the International Institute of Information Technology (IIIT) and presented our in-house development of an **Affordable E-Access Switch -VBoss Vinner** It was a virtual event and evoked a good question-and-answer session.

The department took up the responsibility for setting up the AAC corner in the Museum of Possibilities, the first of its kind in the country.

The department conducted regularly its inhouse AAC training and also trains the prospective special educators of the B.ED course on AAC

Physiotherapy Department

In the academic year 2021-2022, school continued to work in the online mode. Physiotherapy sessions were followed in the online mode in the first and second terms. From March 2022 the department started a hybrid mode of functioning. Around 30 students started attending offline physiotherapy sessions

whereas other students continued online

All the students were asked to visit school for a detailed assessment in march 2022. Following the assessment new goals were planned. Assistive devices were provided to those who needed it at home. We were happy to notice that many parents knew how to do therapy for their children, especially transferring and mobility skills. Many houses were modified and parents started using commode chairs and mobility devices. The goal of the year was focusing on functional mobility and enhancing skills in activities of daily living (ADL). We could achieve this to a great extent with support and participation from the child and the family.

During the second term, we had discussions with all parents individually, to understand if their wards needed any equipment or adaptations that would make them more independent at home. If it was for a child with high support needs, then the support or modifications that would help the carer and the family assist the child in everyday life were explored. Following these discussions, appropriate modifications were made at their houses and necessary assistive devices were given to them.

We have sent standing wheelchairs to 3 student's houses to enable them to learn to stand without much assistance. 14 students were given wheelchairs to use at home. 38 students were given other aids and adaptations like furniture, eating adaptations and orthotic aids to improve their functional independence.

Physiotherapy Department

Field visits to community -based rehabilitation programs were also started. Therapists visited children and families in rural villages and conducted assessment camps along with the special educators and community workers.

Once a week, one senior physiotherapist visits the Institute of Child Health (Baby Hospital) at Egmore and Government Stanley Hospital to do early identification of high-risk babies born with neuromotor disabilities. The babies are referred to us by the neonatal doctors to do the evaluation and to train the baby and the family on early infant stimulation.

Chettinad College of Physiotherapy had invited our therapists to take a session on cerebral palsy and its management for their Physiotherapy students. Two of our Physiotherapists gave a lecture on the topic and we had got good feedback mentioning that it was very useful for the students.

We have purchased a transfer hoist which will be useful for shifting adults with severe physical disabilities, especially when there is not enough supporting hands at home to transfer the adult from one surface to the other.

Vision Center

The Vision Centre of Vidya Sagar works with children and adults with MDVI (Multiple Disabilities with Visual Impairment). The areas of focus are Functional Vision Assessment, Intervention, Documentation & Training Parents, Rehabilitators and Professionals who work with children and adults with MDVI.

Due to the pandemic, our service delivery was mostly virtual. This enabled us to reach out regularly to our stakeholders all over the state, other parts of India and some were abroad too. From March'22 we started working face to face.

We had referrals from hospitals like Sankara Nethralaya, The Eye Foundation, Coimbatore, and schools like Jyothis special school, Palakkad and through parents. The beneficiaries ranged as young as 3 months to as old as 30+ years. The break up is as follows:

Assessments: The challenge of doing vision assessments through virtual mode were overcome by meticulous planning and working hand in hand with the families and guiding them to understand the visual abilities of their children through a video call. The total number of assessments were 50 and the number of follow ups were 29. For the assessments we had used the formal assessment tools as well as the available functional items in the student's home to understand the visual ability of the child.

Intervention and Documentation- Intervention strategies were planned to be a part of the child's routine and materials used were items of everyday use. The staff trained and monitored the family and since the intervention was carried out by the family, they understood how to support the child's visual ability through positioning of the child, the material, proper lighting and giving time for the child to respond.

In the month of March, we had started offline intervention sessions for those who needed intensive intervention. At the same time, we also continued online services to those who could not access direct services due to various reasons. In total, 24 students were given regular sessions both online and offline once in a week.

Conclusion:

As we did the online mode for the second year due to the pandemic, students were regular and we were able to see the parents and other family member's participation during the sessions and they had created materials according to their child's needs. Despite the challenges, many students were regular and they participated fully. We were able to see positive changes in the use of vision for many children during this academic year.

The HRD worked towards the Training and Development of a cadre of resources and support systems for working with persons with disabilities and their families.

The year was again significant because the programs of the department which were offered through remote mode during the pandemic, moved on to a blended mode first and then face to face towards the end of the year. The doors that technology had opened for us during the pandemic, continued to be used to connect to experts who were far.

The major activity of the HRD is running a two year full time B.ED in Special Education, Multiple Disabilities.

Vidya Sagar as a training institute. As a College of Special Education, Vidya Sagar achieved significant milestones-

- The B.ED Special education program run by Vidya Sagar was granted a five year extension of approval by the Rehabilitation Council of India and three year approval from the Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University, the maximum possible from the two monitoring agencies.
- Four special educators graduated during this time and all of them joined Vidya Sagar
- A new batch of teacher training started
- The second-year students had the opportunity for a two months internship in Government schools face to face when the cases came down. This was a rich learning experience for the trainees. The University practical exams also happened face to face. The theory exams were online

The department continued to work towards enhancing the professional capacities of the staff by coordinating training programs, conducting training and facilitating participation of staff in training and workshops. Knowledge sharing happened by having the staff of HRD as resource persons for training programs offered by other organizations.

Another major responsibility of the department is to facilitate internships and volunteering. Technology paved the way for online internships and support. We had students of management from premier institutes interning both through online and face to face mode. There were three interns from IIM Rothak, Three from the SP Jain Institute of Management, Mumbai.

A team of volunteers from Accenture conducted Computer, Music and Spoken English classes for some of the alumni online. An intern from MOP Vaishnav conducted Spoken English sessions for the parents.

Major highlights of staff capacity building programs

- Three staff members completed the one year Arts for Inclusive Practices- an one year certification program offered by Snehadhara Foundation, Bangalore, and they conducted training for all the staff of Vidya Sagar including the administrative staff and the support staff
- The department facilitated the application process for the Teachers Day award and Chitra Ravichandran of FBR, won the best teacher award instituted by NIEPMD
- K S Uma, coordinator, HRD was a part of the expert committee set up by the Rehabilitation Council of India to frame the National Curriculum for the diploma level special education courses in the country.
- A paper titled "My Journey, A sharing" by Abhishek M. Chitra Ravichandran and K S Uma, won the best paper award in the National conference "Augmenting Education of person With disabilities, Trends and Possibilities", conducted by the Tamil Nadu Teachers Education University and MGR Institute of Special Education and Research.

Accessibility

Beach Access

We have been working along with the Disability Rights Alliance (DRA) and the Corporation of Chennai (GCC) on various accessibility projects such as disable-friendly pavements, accessible toilets, inclusive parks, and accessible polling. Since 2016 we have been working for permanent infrastructure to make the Marina beach more accessible for all.

To commemorate the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, which falls on December 3rd, a temporary pathway till the water was put up for a day in 2018 and 2019. After a break due to Covid and excess rains in the first week of December, this year the temporary wooden pathway was available later in the month from 28th December 2021 to 16th Jan 2022, for almost three weeks. This was inaugurated by Mr. Udhayanidi Stalin, MLA along with the Ministers Mr. K.N. Nehru, and Mr. P.K Sekar Babu. M. Gagandeep Singh Bedi, IAS, Commissioner of the Greater Chennai Corporation was also part of the event.

The Government has promised that very soon a permanent pathway will be set up, and a tender process for the same is on the way.

No bus that is not disabled-friendly can be purchased by the Tamil Nadu Government anymore, as the Madras High Court has made it clear such purchase would be in violation of Court order and Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2016. We along with DRA members went to inspect and document the current status of the accessible lift bus. We divided into groups and covered MGR central station, Simson, LIC, Royapettah bus.

The resource persons were Ravi, Sailesh, Kavitha, Dipti Bhatia, and Ummul Khair. The program was well received and the CISF commander wanted the DLU to extend the program to other parts of India either in person or through video conferencing.

BLISS is a work in progress which started in 2018, to develop support systems in the community, which are needed for adults with disabilities to live an independent life. This is an attempt against institutionalisation, because at most times institutions seem to be the only answer. This is also an attempt to find an answer to the universal worry of parents of 'what happens after me?'


BLISS looks into more community based solutions, support systems which ensure safety and security, but also enable participation. At BLISS- Begin to Live Interdependently with Support Systems, we first tried to unpack what' living independently in the community' means to our stakeholders. Each one understands this differently and immediately says, "how is it possible?". That is why we decided to use the word 'interdependent' instead, this does not mean lack of independence, but instead points to the way of the world. All of us live interdependent lives and use supports, which are provided and some we build ourselves.

We find that for adults with disabilities, there is a huge paucity of services in our country.

- There is no manpower trained to support the special needs for adults. For example, caregivers/
 personal attendant/support worker, an essential need that has not yet become a profession in our
 country,
- There is no recognized professional course for a job coach, an independent travel trainer, a group home facilitator or a peer counsellor. Regular counsellors also are not trained to address the needs of adults with complex disabilities.
- Home modifications to make all parts of a home accessible and workplace modifications are almost non-existent, accessible transport is very rarely available for a real inclusive workforce to develop.
- Support Circles are difficult to set up.
- There are no protocols of therapy for long term wheelchair users.
- Sports and other leisure time facilities are very few.
- There are no short term residential facilities which can be stepping stones to develop capacity to become a participating citizen, who can choose where and with whom to live.

BLISS, the Resource Centre has nine pillars, which will set up the support systems. We believe that these will synergise together to create an ecosystem which will provide a safe and vibrant environment for people with disabilities. We hope that, this action based research will help develop support systems which can be replicated across the country, made robust and sustainable

The support systems have been conceptualised as 9 pillars as shown in the diagram below

 Accessible and Supported transport facility- Get Going; SAMBHAV- Museum of Possibilities
- 6. Swayam- Residential facility to develop skills for independent living; Set up group homes.
- 7. Leisure- Pottery, art, yoga, dance, drama, storytelling, music, cooking and sports.
- 8. Peer Counsellors- Persons with Disabilities trained as counsellors to emotionally support our stakeholders in dealing with issues of independent living.
- 9. DLU TED-SS: Trust Enabled Decisions and Support Systems; Advocac

TARA- Team for Accessibility & Reasonable Accommodation

Team working towards making homes and personal spaces accessible for People with Disabilities. A key achievement was getting shortlisted by the 'Zero project 2022 in the theme -Accessibility'. Zero Project, Geneva works for a world with zero barriers. Worldwide, it finds and shares solutions that improve the daily lives and legal rights of all persons with disabilities.

- 1. Home modification and Adaptation projects
 - a. Vidya Sagar- Accessible kitchen-dining-lounge inauguration (july, 2021)

The kitchen cum dining area in Vidya Sagar caters to around 20 residents which includes both People with Disabilities and non-disabled; and a floating crowd during the working days. This space after modification turned into an inclusive environment with:

- Accessible pantry for the residents.
- Spacious seating with facilities to self-serve meals.
- -Community hangout space- a fun corner where the residents could bring in their guests for meet-ups.



The 28-year old building was revamped with the help of a structural engineer based in Thiruvannamalai, identified by TARA.

An initiative of the State Commissionerate for the Welfare of the Differently Abled, Government of Tamil Nadu. Vidya Sagar is the partner to design, curate and manage it. This is a facility cum demonstration centre to showcase a model accessible space with universal design, assistive devices and technology for persons with disabilities covering all domains.

A unique and pioneering ecosystem to:

- Facilitate coming together of PwDs, rehabilitation experts and experts in the field of Assistive Technology.
- Collating a database of manufacturers and venders of customised Assistive devices.

WORK PLAY

- Live: The Live domain includes a model accessible home with Universal Design elements and Assistive Devices available across the country for each part of the house - Living room, Kitchen, Dining, Bedroom and Bathroom.
- Work: The Work domain includes advances in technology in terms of Accessibility and Assistive devices with all Accessible solutions for communication, education, vocational and customised workplace solutions. There is a special focus on AAC- Augmentative and Alternative Communication.
- *Play:* The Play domain includes Accessible Gardening, sports, art and other leisure activities.

The remarkable journey to set up the museum involved a team of people working on:

- Ideating the museum through varied levels of consultations with People with Disabilities and allied experts.
- Database: Accessibility and assistive solutions to be procured from different vendors
- Museum Design: In collaboration with Urban Design Collective and a team of ideators.
- Human Resource: Advertising and choosing of team members to manage the museum, which included the Manager, a speech therapist, a physiotherapist and three museum assistants.
- Liasoning with the Government for smooth functioning

Some of the dominant features are:

- The Impact wall which shows the defining moments in the disability movement.
- The history of the disability sector in India
- Sensory park
- The museum cafe for vocational training in bakery, confectionery and quick service restaurant.




Workforce development

The pillar for Workforce development as the name suggests is for training professionals to work with Adults with Disabilities according to their individual needs. The focus of the training is currently towards creating a pool of caregivers, certified by NIEPMD.

We got funding to train 40 caregivers from Expleo. Some key highlights this year include:

- The First batch of trainees (Jan 2021 -May 2021)
 - We matched the caregivers skills with the needs of the careseekers & placed 5 caregivers.

 Others went back to their organisations and started work there.
 - Maintenance therapy, water management, waste management, Trust building, interpersonal skills, first aid were some of the topics that got included in the existing syllabus.
- Because of the covid outbreak, there was a gap in the training program for the term June 2021-Dec 2021 and hence the next batch started in Jan 2022 - April 2022. This batch included 18 candidates.
- Third Batch: March2022 July 2022 included 10 candidates. A plan is being made to set up the Caregiver Cell to deploy caregivers to the careseekers.

Outreach: To make the caregiver profession a preferred career of choice, active campaigns through posters and short films are made and circulated across networks. <u>Government certified Caregivers</u> <u>Training Course | Vidya Sagar - YouTube</u>

The workforce development coordinators attended a training of trainers organised by Keystone India through online mode.

Disability Legislative Unit: TED-SS: Trust Enabled Decisions with Support Systems

TED-SS: Trust Enabled Decisions and Support Systems is an attempt to build individual Trust documents for each Person with Disability, to ensure that after the parents, there is a first circle of friends and supporters for each one. The Trust identifies the strengths of each supporter and the domain they will look after. The life domains are ADL & hygiene, health & nutrition, communication, personal mobility, transportation, work, leisure, socialisation & recreation, finances, problem solving and safety.

TED-SS focuses on evolving support structures to persons with Disabilities according to ones needs.

- Needs of Persons with Disabilities being segregated into 11 life domains (ADL & hygiene, health & nutrition, communication, personal mobility, transportation, work, leisure, socialisation & recreation, finances, problem solving and safety).
- Evolve a legal trust deed / facilitate Trust for Persons with Disabilities based on the needs and the support structures created.
- Support the trust with a monitoring mechanism and facilitate with other professional services.
- To educate/ work with the students on decision making & support systems at an early age. Facilitate group homes and Accessible housing. (Housing being the primary unit of independent living).
- Explore other facilities / facilitations (including govt/legal/paid support) towards enabling independent living.

This year's activities include:

- 1. Padma's Trust Deed: The trust deed of Padma was refined and finalised after multiple meetings with her mother Kanthi, trustees and lawyers. In the process, we facilitated orientation programs for a few advocates with Advocate Roma. Advocate Mukunth finally worked out the registration. We shared the registered deed of Padma-kanthi with like minded parents to give clarity.
- 2. Sensitisation program on Support circles:
 - We took part in a sensitisation program for lawyers and NGOs / DPOs from Tamilnadu conducted by HRLN and presented the concept on facilitating people with disabilities to live in the community by forming support circles for persons with disabilities in the community as well as framing and executing legal trust deeds based on the need of the person.
 - We had detailed discussions with families of Arun, Shiva, Stuti, Lakshmi Prabha, Divya, and Kavin.

- Discussions with parents about Akshaya inclusive gated community. Vidya Sagar enabled understanding of the support mechanisms of caregiver and group home managers, that may be facilitated by Vidya Sagar at a later stage.
- Questions and queries of parents are constantly discussed and solutions sought.
- 3. Stuti's Trust Deed: We also started working closely with Adv Pradeep from HRLN who has been facilitating the process of drafting Stuti's trust deed. Parallely, we also had multiple discussions on the support needs of Stuti and getting a suitable support circle evolved for her.
- 4. Attempted to mobilise volunteers for developing support circles of a few adult members.
- 5. We facilitated the guardianship process through DLU and the process of assigning the parents' pension to the ward.
- 6. Other areas under discussion include:
 - Dismantling the trust after the lifetime of the adult with disability
 - The responsibility and flexibility of roles that trustees can exercise
 - Tax exemption for individual trusts formed for persons with disabilities
 - Assigning student volunteers from colleges to facilitate the experience of support circle doing a community support resource mapping as well as evolving individual PATH for persons with disabilities
 - Planning to facilitate a group home experience
